The manner in which we prepare educational personnel is informed by eight essential attributes: (1) Ensuring that programs are knowledge-based: (2) viewing educational personnel as learners, including a focus on deconstructing past experiences as learners in coursework and field experiences and developing appropriate knowledge of the content and discourse of the disciplines to be taught;

(3) contextual and cultural sensitivity; (4) enabling authentic participation, collegiality and collaboration; (5) facilitating inquiry and reflection, i.e.
